EDITORIAL

VALEDICTORY OF PAST EXALTED RULER

IT HAS been said that when a man wishes to be pungent in his remarks he should be brief; "for it is with words as with sunbeams, the more that they are condensed, the deeper they burn." It is on an occasion such as this, when one is confronted with the passing of time and change, that I would wish with all my heart for some brief sentence in some powerfully condensed form, into which I might express to you the emotions that are in my inner-most being at this moment. I would try to tell you of the joy that I have had in the occupancy of this chair as your Exalted Ruler; of the knowledge I have gained of my fellow-men and of myself, a knowledge which has been composite, including disappointments in myself, pride in my brothers, joy in my friendships and the many varied contacts I have made, happiness in service, and, occasionally, a feeling of deep satisfaction in the knowing that I have been endeavoring at least toward the accomplishments of dreams that have been mutually ours—yours and mine, and have failed as well as have succeeded. This has given the tang and zest to these endeavors, and makes the honor of holding this office, one that is not a burden but a thrill,—a thrill vibrant with life, with doing, with achievement toward, one might almost say, a feeling of true spiritual exaltation.

And so, my Brothers, I would express here and now, my appreciation to you for having made all this possible for me through your having elected me to this chair, which I have endeavored to fill to the best of my ability, and I wish to extend my sincerest thanks and appreciation for the courtesy, the conscientiousness, and untiring efforts and spirit of real co-operation that have been outstanding in the officers with whom it has been my privilege to have worked in this realm of leadership.

Because time is passing, and I wish to be as brief as possible, I want to thank personally many of those men whose wisdom, tact and enthusiasm have filled me with esteem and admiration for them individually.

I wish to offer my first thanks to the Directors of the Building Association; Elmer Garrett and the members of the Drill Team for the wonderful assistance they have given for the past two years in helping to make our initiation services dignified; and Brother Jess Wood who has worked so earnestly and well in handling many of the affairs of the Lodge and in being a private representative of the Exalted Ruler. A great deal of my success and the success of the activities of this Lodge have rested largely on his shoulders. It was my thought at one time to give him the official title of secretary to the Exalted Ruler, because I felt that he deserved some official recognition, but Jess Wood's love for the Order, and his modesty, would not allow any official title to be conferred upon him. He simply wished to be one of the members of the ranks. Time nor space will not permit me to further elaborate on the splendid qualities of Brother Wood, nor on the great help that he has been to me.

I wish to thank the Chairman of the Reception Committee, and to pay special tribute to the members. Paul Keeler was the first chairman, and devoted much of his time gathering and welding together this great organization, and then turned it over to Mike Rudolph. It is one of the best working organizations that it has been my pleasure to witness, and it is my hope that my successor will carry on and encourage this committee because I realize that it has been instrumental in making Los Angeles Lodge No. 99 the outstanding lodge of welcome that it is today. Both of these Brothers have given of their time and ability to the cause of our great organization, and no money

in all the world can buy nor pay for such services as they have rendered.

Thanks are due to Brother Harold Roberts, who is the leader of our musical activities, and who it was my pleasure to bring into this organization. He deserves the thanks and commendation of our entire Lodge, and we also owe a great deal of our pleasure to Harry Fredeen, leader of our Orchestra; and I wish to thank the members of the Orchestra as well.

I wish to thank Brother Glenn M. Tyndall, leader, and Bunny Crawford, manager of the Glee Club, and all members of the Glee Club. Brother Lewis, who is now in charge, and you heard him for the first time as leader of the new Glee Club, is here thanked in advance for the services he will so ably perform in the future.

Ike Wentworth, the old war horse, chairman of the Golf Committee, know full well how much I appreciate the services he has rendered.

And Wallie Stockton, Bob Weaver, and all officers of the Athletic Committee, have been a tower of strength to me during my term of office.

I wish to thank Brother Gavin Young, chairman of the Entertainment Committee, who for the past two years has served most efficiently, and who I hope will carry on together with Brother Harry M. Owens, as chairman of the Old Folks Committee. Their work has been splendidly unselfish, and during the past two years they have been instrumental in not only entertaining the members of 99 and the Brothers who are less fortunate, but have also carried cheer and comfort to the Shut-ins at Olive View, the County Farm, Berlow's Sanitarium, and many other institutions who look to the Elks for all their amusement and channel of escape from their houses of pain.

And now I come to Brother Kincaid, who is our Chaplain, and chairman of our Sick Committee. I confess I am at a loss for words to express to this brother, the power and good that he is to 99 in the taking care of the sick, and in performing the last sad rites to our departed brothers. Brother Kincaid's duties remind me a great deal of a railroad man whose services are called upon day and night; he is ever ready to stand with us in our hour of grief, and we are fortunate in having a man who is so ably and sympathetically adapted to this service to his fellow-men. With all my visitations to the sick and needy, Brother Kincaid has been the outstanding man who has shone like a beacon light, and one hears only words of highest commendation regarding him.

Thanks are due also to my Esquire, Brother Dean Barris, who, since being appointed Esquire, has functioned 100 per cent at all funerals. I take this opportunity to thank Assistant Esquire E. G. Thomas, House Parsons, together with Harry G. Rudolph, C. S. Barnes, M. A. Varco, who so ably assisted our tiler, Frank Akers.

Brother Jack Oberle, Assistant Inner Guard, who has not missed a meeting during the past two years, deserves great praise and my sincere appreciation for his faithfulness, and I am indebted to Harry Shelton, electrician and chairman of the Stage Hand's Committee, together with Brothers George L. Armstrong, Rush Niebocker and Carl and Kenneth McNairy.

It seems fitting at this time, to express my sincere thanks and appreciation to Brother Thomas Abbott, chairman of the Grave Decorations, and his able Committee.

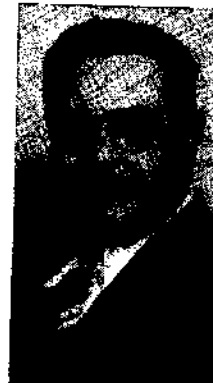

Opening May 9 and continuing until May 19 inclusive, the first annual "Los Angeles National Sports Exposition" will be held under the auspices of Elks Lodge No. 99 to aid in defraying the expenses of the Grand Lodge Convention in Los Angeles from July 7 to 13, and entertaining our thousands of visitors.

The success of the "National Sports Exposition" this year will eliminate appealing to merchants and public-spirited citizens for contributions, and the future annual receipts will divert to the Elks' Charity Fund.

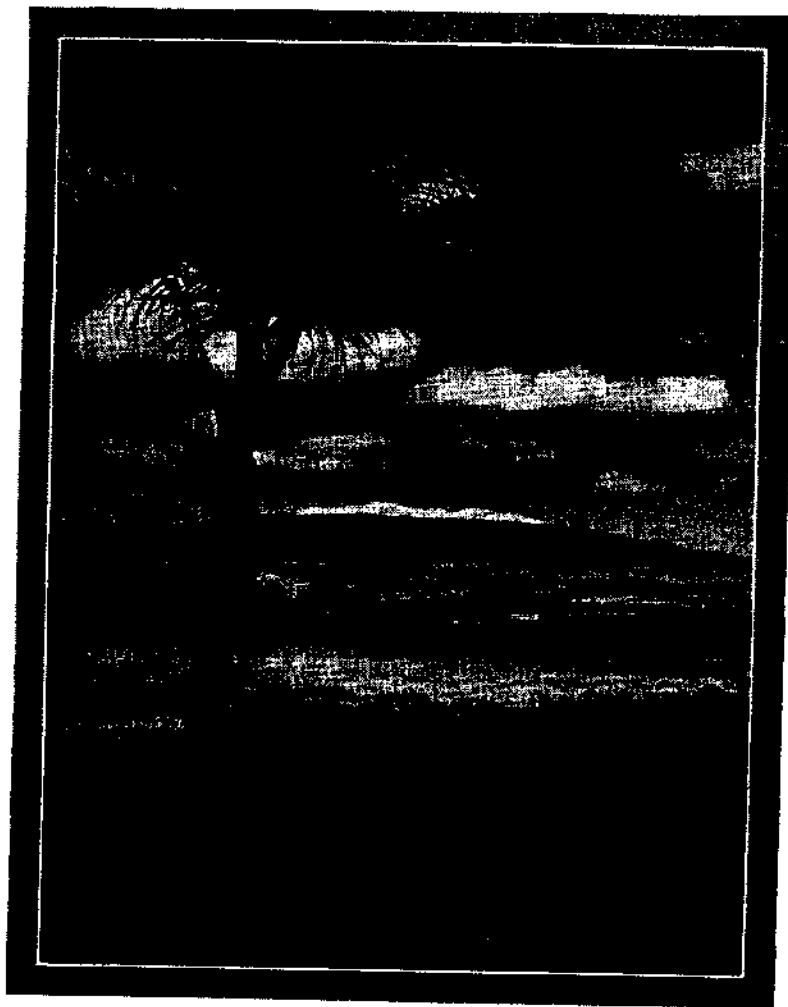
Wonderful support was assured a week ago last Monday at a meeting held at the Elks' Club, where seventy prominent citizens met and enthusiastically endorsed this show. These men represented practically every civic, municipal, educational, and other important organizations in our community, and were appointed to head various committees. With this support, we can create the largest exposition of this nature ever held in America, which will help advertise Southern California as the World's Greatest Playground.

The Order of Elks is particularly interested in the moral and physical development of youth, therefore, the athletic features which we propose having, will be a tremendous and beneficial influence to our community.

The "Los Angeles National Sports Exposition" will be held in a specially constructed temporary building, which will provide over 600 booths for national and local exhibitors. These exhibits will feature all types of merchandise pertaining to sports and recreation with educational displays featuring Aeronautics, Motor Boats, Outdoor Recreation, Governmental Forestry, Fish and Game exhibits, Playground, Boy Scout and Campfire Girl, and other interesting and health building activities, as well as many other attractions.

There also will be an athletic stadium with a seating capacity in excess of 20,000, in which there will be a specially constructed eight-lap track. The three blocks situated on the north side of Wilshire Boulevard, between Hauser and Curson running to Sixth Street, is the anticipated location for the exposition. It is our intention to landscape the three blocks facing Wilshire boulevard. We will construct the temporary exposition building in the middle block with the athletic stadium in the rear. Back of the landscaping, we will construct small corrals to hold a herd of Elk and other animals. Back of these corrals, we will use the space for automobile parking.

The luncheon and fashion show held March 19 was well attended. Many beautiful costumes were displayed by The Silver Style Shop, and nearly three hundred women attended this affair.

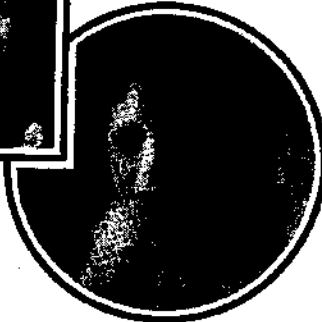

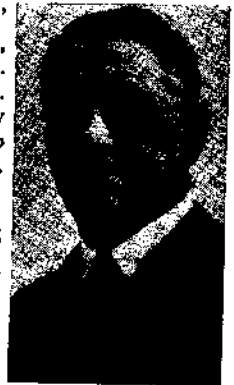

Yachting

The coming regatta and yachting season gives promise of being a most active one. Regattas are to be conducted on various parts of the Coast, and in addition, Southern California yachtsmen are being invited to participate in yachting events in all corners of the globe.

In a recent letter to Bro. J. Park Dougall, Commodore of the California Yachting Club, the secretary of the Yachtsmen's Association of America voted that the Italian Committee for the International Motor Boat meet at Venice, Italy, Sept. 2 to 15, furnish free transportation for competing boats from New York to Genoa. This race will be run under the patronage of His Majesty the King of Italy, His Royal Highness the Crown Prince and His Excellency Benito Mussolini. Count Volpi Di Misurato also will present a cup in the unlimited class.

In this connection there will be held in the United States on July 4, the 200 mile outboard race at Peoria, Illinois, on Aug. 24 and 25, the Gold Cup regatta at Redbank, New Jersey, and on Aug. 31, and for several days following the International Motor Boat regatta at Detroit, Mich.

The Coast Regattas will continue with a race to San Francisco, a challenge having been made and tentatively accepted. The usual summer races will then take place, to be followed by a regatta at the Isthmus, Catalina Island, probably the first week in August, from which place the yachtsmen will go to San Francisco to participate in a regatta in August at that port. This regatta will be the largest affair of the kind that has been attempted by northern yachtsmen.

The March regatta established the fact that when yachtsmen are sufficiently enthusiastic, races can be run under any circumstances. The weather was heavy going with plenty of wind but many interesting figures for statistical purposes were obtained at this regatta. Boats which should have made the best showing, in some instances were outdistanced and outclassed by smaller and less able boats. The motto of "Sail 'em or sink 'em" was adopted by the skippers and they carried it through the week.

Friday A. M. Club

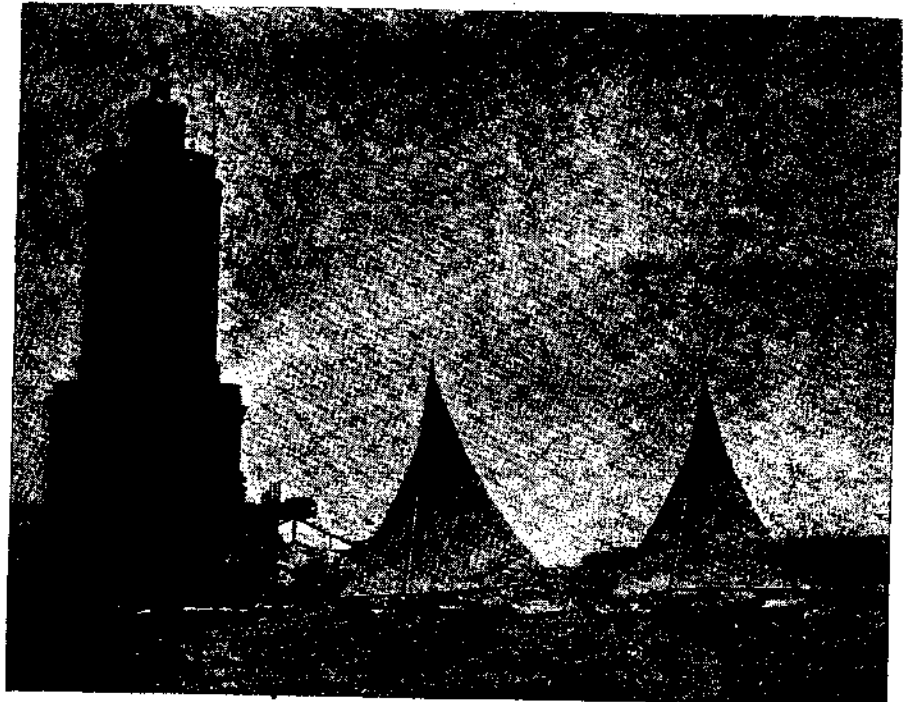

Dr. Caesar Cahen, Chevalier of the Legion of Honor, recipient of the Croix de Guerre for meritorious service with the French Army during the world war, and all round good-fellow, made the March auspicious by serving as chairman for the Sunrisers.

With a ready wit, a splendid sense of humor and a charming manner, the doctor presided with

the grace of an ambassador and the grace of a diplomat. Programs of merit were arranged by the chairman and a capacity attendance was the order of all meetings.

Chief of the entertainers, furnished through the courtesy of Sunriseser Harry Gollob, was "Cookie" Bowers, introduced as Dr. Bowers of Bellevue Hospital Psychopathic Ward, New York City. The pseudo psychologist immediately called attention to several of the Sunrisers present as being splendid subjects for his mental ward. Just as the affair threatened to become serious, Cookie launched into his act, which comprised a number of clever imitations.

On March 12, official cameraman, Lou Nestel, brought with him his trusty camera and motion pictures were taken of all Sunrisers, and projected on a portable screen at the March 26 meeting. It is needless to say that the photographic results were beyond artistic expectations. I fully realize, more than any of you, my shortcomings and inability to stand alone.

I sincerely hope and trust that you all will give to the present Exalted Ruler, Brother Gibbs and his officers, the same unstinted co-operation and enthusiasm that you have so generously given to me. I have made many mistakes as your presiding officer, but they were mistakes of the head and not of the heart. I have no doubt unconsciously stepped on the toes of some of the Brothers, and at times, may have offended others. If I have, I wish to assure you that it was not intentional, and I hope that my mistakes may be forgotten. Elbert Hubbard was once asked, "Who is your brother?" He answered, "Who is my brother?" I'll tell you—he is the one who recognizes the good in me." And so, because you are my Brothers, I feel confident that for my blunders you will hold no ill will.

Turning over the gavel to my successor, I have been told by many of my predecessors, would be one of the happiest moments of my administration; that a great load would be lifted from my shoulders, but, my friends, if this has been the experience of the others, I must admit that it is with a vastly different emotion that I relinquish this symbol of honor and authority to my successor. I mean to say, that inasmuch as the members and my staff of officers have made the load so easy to carry, I have no sign of relief. I have no desire to say, "Now I am free—free from the heavy responsibilities of office."

It would seem fitting at this time, to offer a word of welcome to the incoming Exalted Ruler and his corps of officers, and I hand over the gavel with a tenderness, with a sort of empty feeling, like that one has when one first leaves home to branch out into the world for himself; with a feeling also of pride and confidence in the thought that my brothers and co-workers gave me the opportunity to grasp it and to feel the power for good and beauty of endeavor that is symbolized in this gavel of the Exalted Ruler. Yes, I have commingled emotions, my brothers, as I tender the gavel to Brother Gibbs, my successor, pride in the past achievements and experiences, pride also in the future because it will be wielded by the hand of a man thoroughly capable of using it with wisdom, judgment and honor, and I look forward with the keenest sense of anticipation and enjoyment in the knowledge that, to express it in the words of Kipling, "he's a better man than I am," is Ed. Gibbs.

I am now stepping down to take a seat among the members of the Lodge, to once again join the ranks as one of the audience, and I am counting on that brotherly word of welcome and the friendly handclasp that I want you to give me as we sit side by side in the future, watching the progress and splendid new work that will be carried on so ably by our present Exalted Ruler, Brother Ed Gibbs.

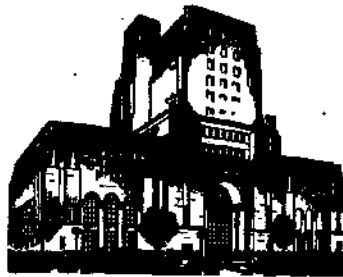
