the non-suspended or unaffiliated spouse is treated as if he or she were never a Member."

POW risked beatings to recite Pledge

As you may know, I spent 5 1/2 years as a prisoner of war during the Vietnam War. In the early years of our imprisonment, the NVA kept us in solitary confinement or two or three to a cell. In 1971 the NVA moved us from these conditions of isolation into large rooms with as many as 30 to 40 men to a room.

This was, as you can imagine, a wonderful change and was a direct result of the efforts of millions of Americans on behalf of a few hundred POWs 10,000 miles from home.

One of the men who moved into my room was a young man named Mike Christian. Mike came from a small town near Selma, AL. He didn't wear a pair of shoes until he was 13 years old. At 17, he enlisted in the U.S. Navy. He later earned a commission by going to Officer Training School. Then he became a Naval

Flight Officer and was shot down and captured in 1967. Mike had a keen and deep appreciation of the opportunities this country and our military provide for people who want to work and want to succeed.

As part of the change in treatment, the Vietnamese allowed some prisoners to receive packages from home. In some of these packages were handkerchiefs, scarves and other items of clothing. Mike

If your Lodge has access to a pair of fatal vision goggles, these make for a great activity for the older kids – try to walk a straight line, bounce a tennis ball or even try to pick up a set of keys.

In supporting the Elks National Youth Week, the Elks National Drug Awareness Program strives to teach all children and parents about the dangers of illegal drug use and prevent the abuse of legalized and prescription drugs. As the nation's largest volunteer drug awareness program, the program relies on state, district and Lodge volunteers to promote a drug-free lifestyle by their attendance at all Elks youth events such as Youth Week, Hoop Shoot, Soccer Shoot or Kids Fishing Derby. A drug awareness activity should always be included to illustrate the Elks' commitment to combating youth drug use through education and inspiration, and creating stronger activities and greater communication with local schools.

GRAND LODGE ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE A scant 7.4 percent of Elks Lodges nationwide now sponsor Antlers programs, 2012 Grand Lodge figures show, but hundreds more are needed as one more

means of increasing our membership ranks and to better ensure our survival as a viable nationwide benevolent society.

A blueprint for establishing an Antlers program for youngsters ages 12-20 is easily available at Elks.Org. Go to the Activities

Committee home page and click on "Antlers" on the right side of the page. Print out the electronic files of bylaws, rules and regulations for setting up an Antlers program for Lodges' review. The material provides all the framework a Lodge would need to start a program.

The only ingredient Lodges will need to supply is the desire to see both the program and our Order grow over the long haul.

The Antlers have been around since before World War II but interest waned in the 1960s, and the program was disbanded. The program was revived at the 2002 Grand Lodge Session and implemented by the now-defunct Grand Lodge Youth Activities Committee. Your Grand Lodge Activities Committee now administers the program.

The major objectives of the Antlers remain squarely in line with those we all hold dear as Elks Members:

- To quicken the spirit of American patriotism;
- To teach respect for parents and love of home:
- To inculcate the fundamentals of good citizenship;
 - To aid in a worthy cause;
 - To establish a foundation of character;
- To promote the welfare and enhance the happiness of its members, and
- To respect the convictions of others in matters of worship and religion is true Americanism.

Please, Elks Lodges, your Grand Lodge Activities Committee calls upon you to consider the benefits that your communities could reap by starting an Antlers program. A strong program would also help ensure our future of service to our towns, states and nation through a thriving membership.

got himself a bamboo needle. Over a period of a couple of months, he created an American flag and sewed it on the inside of his shirt. Every afternoon, before we had a bowl of soup, we would hang Mike's shirt on the wall of the cell and say the Pledge of Allegiance.

I know the Pledge of Allegiance may not seem the most important part of our day now, but I can assure you that in that stark cell it was indeed the most important and meaningful event.

One day the Vietnamese searched our cell, as they did periodically, and discovered Mike's shirt with the flag sewn inside, and removed it.

That evening they returned, opened the door of the cell, and for the benefit of all of us, beat Mike Christian severely for the next couple of hours. Then, they opened the door of the cell and threw him in. We cleaned him up as well as we could.

The cell in which we lived had a concrete slab in the middle on which we slept. Four naked light bulbs hung in each corner of the room.

As I said, we tried to clean up Mike as well as we could. After the excitement died down, I looked in the corner of the room, and sitting there beneath that dim light bulb with a piece of red cloth, another shirt and his bamboo needle, was my friend, Mike Christian. He was sitting there with his eyes almost shut from the beating he had received, making another American flag. He was not making the flag because it made Mike Christian feel better. He was making that flag because he knew how important it was to us to be able to Pledge our Allegiance to our flag and country.

So the next time you say the Pledge of Allegiance, you must never forget the sacrifice and courage that thousands of Americans have made to build our nation and promote freedom around the world. You must remember our duty, our honor, and our country.

"I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

The Medal of Valor is to be presented to the deserving family of the fallen hero who gave up his or her life in the ongoing Iraqi and Afghanistan conflicts.

The medals are made in the United States and come with a presentation case. The front of the medal is

engraved with "Operation Enduring Freedom" on top and "Operation Iraqi Freedom" on the bottom. The back of the medal is suitable for engraving the name of the deceased veteran and also states "Presented by the Grand Lodge of the B.P.O. Elks to the family of (Name) in recognition of their supreme sacrifice." The cost is \$8 per medal, which includes shipping.

If you know of a family or families in your community who have lost a loved one in Iraq or Afghanistan, it would be a wonderful gesture to honor that person by presenting a Medal of Valor to that family. It could be presented to the family at a function at your Lodge or at some other appropriate venue, showing that Elks care and are grateful for their service and protecting us and our country.
