Antlers add to Lodge programs

Lodges looking for ways to increase membership, reach out to the community and support youth programs can get a helping hand by sponsoring an Antlers program.

The Antlers, made up of youth ages 12 to 20, elect their own President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and Trustees, and appoint a Sergeant at Arms, Guard and Chaplain. Together they can add a new dimension to any Elks Lodge's community outreach.

Sponsoring Lodges authorize their Exalted Rulers to appoint a five-member Advisory Council to organize an Antlers Lodge. Only 15 people eligible for membership are needed to form an Antlers program.

Antlers members over age 20 become an advisor until their 21st birthday when they may apply for Elks membership.

Between ages 20 and 21 Antlers members do not need to pay dues.

Antlers will be required to hold business meetings similar to those of Elks Lodges, with the opening business session and closing.

The Antlers – created by the then-Grand Lodge Youth Activities Committee and approved at the 2002 Grand Lodge Session in Reno – is now a fully functioning program of the Grand Lodge Activities Committee.

Final Report Form and receipts, or return unused grant monies, will be ineligible for any future grants, either from the Elks National Veterans Service Commission or the Elks National Foundation.

Elks & Scouting: A win-win

With the 2013-14 Lodge year nearly behind us and planning for 2014-15 under way, a renewed commitment to Elkdom and Scouting is in order.

If your Lodge already sponsors a Boy or Girl Scout Troop then think of how to expand that sponsorship beyond financial help. Do they have projects that we can assist, or provide a room for meetings? Do we recognize the Scouts' achievements with Eagle Scout or Gold and Silver Girl Scouts awards? Maybe all we have to do is ask the Scout Leader how the Lodge may provide more help.

Many Elks communities still have no opportunity for youth to join a Troop because the Lodge has failed to sponsor one. If your Lodge is not now sponsoring a Troop, why not sponsor one? How better to serve the youth than to be a part of scouting.

The first step is to contact your local or district Scouting unit. They will take it from there and soon let you know if you can be a part of a Troop near you. Your Lodge can fulfill its charitable objectives by sponsoring a Troop.

Most Lodges have a Member who has children involved in Scouting. There is no better way for that Member to become active in the Lodge than by helping that Member with his or

her Troop. Some Troops have young families with friends who are not now Elks. Building members with the same interests is a very good recruiting tool.

Today's Scouts can become future Elks, but Lodges need to engage them now. Start forming relationships with Scouts, and see how it benefits you and your Lodge. Contact your Regional Scouting Chairman to get started.

For those Lodges that are doing the Eagle Scout or Girl Scout Gold or Silver awards, you need to contact Grand Lodge for a special printed certificate along with the Grand Exalted Ruler's congratulatory letter. To request a Scouting award, email Patricia Dempsey, patriciad@elks.org, in the Grand Lodge Office. Include the recipient's name as it is to appear on the certificate, Troop number, date the award is to be given and the address to which to send the certificate.

Elks partner to Donate Life

Are you aware that you can potentially save or improve as many as 50 lives as an organ or tissue donor? Many people on waiting lists never receive the gift of life because of the shortage of donors.

Excuses not to donate – such as: I'm too old; I'm not in good health; my family would be upset – seem selfish or silly when someone you care about is on the list.

Neither age nor many medical conditions disqualify you from donating. The decision to use an organ or tissue is based on strict medical criteria from testing and questions. Trust the medical team to make that decision. Many families say that knowing their loved one saved other lives helped them cope with their loss.

I have two step-sons who are alive today only through the generous, loving donations of others' hearts.

Twenty years ago, at 17, Jeremy needed a heart as his was severely damaged by a virus. Seven years later, his twin brother Jeff, whose heart was damaged by the same virus, needed a heart. Those two have given us three of our grandchildren, as life continues through the generosity of others.

Saying you will donate is easy, but the key is to make your wishes known. To ensure that they are carried out, put them in writing and include them in a living will. If someone is designated to make health care decisions on your behalf, make sure he or she knows your wishes. Hospitals normally seek consent from the next of kin before removing organs, but usually are not required to do so if you're registered with your state's donor registry. You need to:

- Register at your state's donor registry
- Designate your choice on your driver's license
- Carry a donor card
- Go to http://www.livingdonorsonline.org/ and become a living donor. Ask your doctor for details.

Gift that keeps on giving

The Dictionary Project, founded in 1995 to provide a dictionary to every third-grade student in South Carolina, has since grown nationally with some 20 million dictionaries distributed to third-graders in all 50 states.

In 2004 the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks joined this movement, distributing more than 1.2 million dictionaries through 600 participating Lodges since that year.

A dictionary – perhaps the first and most powerful reference tool a child can own – is a companion that assists students as they develop their reading and writing skills. Students benefit from increased self-reliance and resourcefulness when they are able to look up a word for themselves. Most public schools struggle with day-to-day operating costs and are unable to provide dictionaries to individual students. School administrators and teachers appreciate our help.

Elks Lodges may start a Dictionary Project in their communities by contacting elementary school principals to explain the project. Once Lodges have permission to proceed, they obtain the number of third-grade students enrolled in each school to determine the number of dictionaries to order.

If Lodges discover another organization is already providing dictionaries to a given school, remember that next year a new group of third graders will need dictionaries. Contact the other organization and let them know you are willing to work with them on the project. One Lodge, when it found another organization was already distributing dictionaries, discovered that there was a need for Thesauruses in the fourth grade. This was that Lodge's project.

How is your Lodge using your Elks National Foundation grants? The dictionary program is a wonderful community program that can influence the lives of children for many years. One student wrote, "Elks are special people. I would love to be an Elk but I am not old enough. I think it would be fun to be in a club that helps kids. I love my dictionary."

This is done by having the charitable reports completed each year and sent

to Grand Lodge on time each year. This information is a stepping stone to ensure that the public knows more about us and our good works. Be a contributor to your local news by spelling out these amounts and our charitable activities.

Your Government Relations Committee uses this information when we talk to the local, state and federal agencies about the affairs that impact our Order. We also use it when meeting with politicians to discuss items that might affect our Order.

This information is invaluable to the committees at the Grand Lodge, state and local levels.

Each Elks Member is also a committee member. You can help by talking to your

elected officials about our Order. Send them information about us, and invite them to your Lodge to see for themselves what we do. Your Lodge can host a night where your local elected officials are invited for a tour and discussion. You would be surprised by how much we all have in common.

But lastly, keep in mind your Government Relations Committee is there for you and is very important to our Order. Without it a large gap would exist in the communications between our Order, Lodges and general public. Make sure it is around for a long time. We truly care about Elkdom.

\$2,000 Freedom Grants available to Lodges in 2014-15

The Elks National Veterans Service Commission is happy to announce that Freedom Grants of \$2,000 each will

again be available to Lodges for 2014-2015. Recognizing the increasing popularity of these Freedom Grants and the innovative service being provided to our veterans and military through them, the Commission will this year award 140 Freedom Grants to

Local Lodges that wish to serve veterans or active duty military personnel in their community. That's an increase of 15 grants over 2013-2014. Applications will

be judged on their expected impact on veterans and quality of Lodge support. Lodges can apply online only, from August 1, 2014, through August 31, 2014. Grants will be awarded in September for

events or programs to take place before July 31, 2015.

To best serve your community's veterans or active duty military personnel, while promoting your Lodge and the Elks, we encourage you to use

the Freedom Grant for more than a cash donation. Develop a grant project that involves veterans or active duty military personnel and utilizes Elks volunteers

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as much as possible. Freedom Grants can be used for one or more events, as well as combined with grants from the Elks National Foundation to create larger programs having a greater impact.

Either the Lodge Secretary or the designated Lodge Grants Coordinator may apply for a Freedom Grant.

Before applying, be ready to describe your program, its expected impact (what need you hope to meet), and a projected budget. If your Lodge receives a Freedom Grant, you will have to complete a Final Report Form after the event has taken place, and return it to ENVSC headquarters along with grant-related receipts. Lodges that do not return the
