"Nothing could be further from the truth," Elks Drug Awareness National Director Kent Gade said, indicating that the months following the Grand Lodge Session are some of the busiest for the Drug Awareness Program.

In addition to getting State Chairs ready for the beginning of a new school year, which includes ordering school-requested materials and rolling out the new DAP comic book, "What Heroes Do" (used in schools' health classes), State Chairs are busy lining up dates for the Elks' DAP Tour featuring nationally recognized speaker Ray Lozano, an Elk himself. State Chairs are also busy setting up Poster,

Video and Essay Contests, which run throughout the year, depending upon school calendars and teachers' wishes.

"There's a lot more happening in the fall," said Gade, adding that this is the time for such things as the Red Ribbon celebration and the Enrique S. Camarena Award. The Red Ribbon celebration recognizes the everyday sacrifices that law enforcement officers, firefighters and other first responders make to keep our children safe

was brutally kidnapped and murdered in the line of duty," Gade said. "A childhood friend, Henry Lozano, also an Elk, along with California Congressman Duncan Hunter, created 'Camarena Clubs,' and from that came the Red Ribbon celebration."

During the next few months, State Drug Awareness Chairs will ask individual Lodges to nominate someone in their area of service for the Enrique S. Camarena Award.

"This is the most prestigious Award the DAP has to offer," Gade said, noting that along with recognizing an individual in law enforcement, the community where that officer worked is also presented with a life-sized bust of Agent Camarena.

"We don't want anyone to forget the sacrifice that 'Kiki' made to this country," Gade added.

But the work doesn't stop there.

"We're going Hollywood!" Gade exclaimed. He said that through hard work of the DAP directors and the PGER sub-committee, the program has united with the DEA.

With assistance from the Elks National Foundation and former Marvel executive Robert Samboni, the Elks DAP has negotiated a contract with SMOSH to create an anti-drug message, which will be viewed by more than 6 million teenagers!

Gade noted that this has been a dream of his for the past decade.

SMOSH is an American sketch-comedy YouTube channel. As of August, the SMOSH channel has more than 6 billion video views and 22 million subscribers, making it the 12th most subscribed channel on YouTube.

"We will now be able to reach children and teens all over the country," remarked Gade. "If kids didn't know the name 'Elks' before, they certainly will now!"

So if you thought the Elks Drug Awareness Program could take a little rest after Reno...think again!

DEA forges ties with Elks as drug epidemic worsens

Acting Drug Enforcement Administration Administrator Chuck Rosenberg – a guest of the Drug Awareness Program at the Elks National Convention in Reno in July – had a grim

message in an address to convention delegates.

"More than 59,000 people die a year of drug overdoses, and it's going to get worse," he

said, warning that while heroin addiction is already a nationwide epidemic, a synthetic opioid called fentanyl is 50 times as bad and is becoming increasingly popular.

"We can't enforce, interdict and incarcerate our way out of this one," said Rosenberg. "We have to change our culture, and that's where good men and women like yourselves can help."

Rosenberg, the highest-level U.S. government official to

attend a Grand Lodge Convention in decades, noted two key areas where Elks can help fight the opioid epidemic.

This call for help was also repeated by Sean Fearns, DEA chief of Community Outreach who spoke at the Drug Awareness

> Seminar at the Reno convention. As four of five heroin addicts get their start on prescription pain medicines, and most pain medicine addicts get their pills from people who have received

them legitimately, a good way to help is to eliminate unneeded pain medications from people's medicine cabinets. The DEA runs nationwide Prescription Drug Take-back Days twice yearly, and Elks can help by publicizing these days and volunteering to assist with local take-back efforts.

The next Take-back day is 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Oct. 28. Check

Have our Members done enough? At this year's National Convention in Reno, NV, we found that our charitable reporting rose from \$282,160,455 in 2015-16 to \$334,292,982 in 2016-17, an 18 percent increase.

Congratulations to all those who helped make that number grow. We can't break that down to find out if those numbers represented new activities within our Lodges, or just the fact that we got better in reporting the many things we do. We suspect it's probably some of both. In any case it really doesn't matter.

The fact is the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks recorded an increase in our charitable efforts. With that, we must ask ourselves, is that enough? How many times have we neglected to accurately record all of

The Government Relations Committee believes we still continue to under-report our giving. It's just a matter of how much. For 2017-18 we're trying to record \$365,000,000 in charitable giving or \$1,000,000 each day! Can you help us achieve our goal?

Most Elks are dedicated to the many ways we improve the lives of those of our communities. We see things that need to be improved, and we set about to accomplish them. We've done that for decades. It's become a way of life.

Let me challenge you with this thought. It has now become extremely important that we document all of the time we spend each and every day in service to our Order. How important is our record keeping? Could it possibly be just as important as the work itself? If we looked at it in that respect, I think we would take that extra time to make sure we are accurate in what we do. That must be a commitment that each of us must make.

If our efforts through our liaison in Washington are to be successful, then we must also put forth the effort to assist in everything we can do. We realize we are not able to completely overcome the under-reporting of the past, but we must all put forth the effort to improve the future.

Can we count on you? As dedicated Elks, I know what the answer will be! If each of us would contribute, we can make that goal of \$1,000,000 per day become a reality. I'm in! How about you? Make reporting as much of a priority as our charitable efforts!

the DEA website (dea.gov) for take-back sites in your community and encourage your Lodge Members to help spread the word in your community to take this opportunity to dispose of their old or unused medications.

A second way Elks can help is through interactions with young people. Rosenberg pointed out that "If you don't start by the time you turn 25, odds are nearly zero you will ever become addicted."

Therefore, the Elks' existing youth-oriented Drug Awareness Program is a great start, and two additional resources available from the DEA include an educational curriculum available from www.operationprevention. com and the movie "Chasing the Dragon," a hard-hitting documentary produced by the DEA and FBI that reveals the true costs of heroin and opioid addiction.

For years, the DEA has focused on enforcing the nation's controlled substances laws, and on bringing to the criminal and civil justice system those organizations involved in the growing, manufacture or distribution of controlled substances appearing in or destined for illicit traffic in the United States.

According to Fearns, the DEA can no longer ignore prevention – "without it we cannot keep up and we will lose the fight," and the work that the Elks do is vital to help the DEA do their job.

The study shows that patients who reported higher rates of social isolation had worse health than expected.

On the other hand, patients with

the same health issues who reported lower rates of social isolation and closer ties with family and friends, had better health than expected.

The only difference between the groups was more frequent contact and connection with other people.

Good relationships and regular social interaction can improve physical health.

This study, which builds on previous research, affirms what many Adopt-A-Veteran volunteers have known: A small

amount of your time can be invaluable to a veteran in need.

This is the perfect time to get involved with Adopt-A-Veteran. And it's so easy to begin! Visit a local Veterans Administration facility, State Veterans Home, nursing home or transitional facility to connect with a local veteran in need. Then, simply be a friend.
