Since 2004, the Elks have partnered with the Dictionary Project to ensure that every student will enjoy the benefits of owning their own dictionary—an essential tool for a quality education.

As of Spring 2021, the Elks have delivered close to 4 million copies of dictionaries to third-graders. However, in recent years some Lodges have received resistance from schools to distribute dictionaries to their students because most curriculums use the internet to look up words and definitions. Most of you will agree that books still play an important role in the education process: Books stimulate the imagination.

Using technology as the primary source of information creates learning limitations and distractions. Research has reported that students who read print versus e-books experience less mental fatigue and significant lower levels of eve fatigue, retain more information, and score better on comprehension tests. If you really want to fight the battle, there are many test results and studies about electronic world.

reading a book versus an e-book.

Lodges that continue to participate in the Dictionary Project observed that children still appreciate and get excited receiving their own dictionary. If schools are not interested in the program, consider handing out dictionaries at your Lodge, a library, or an after-school facility.

For those who have never participated in the Dictionary Program, visit the website at dictionaryproject.org. You can look through the variety of dictionaries available and ask to receive a sample kit. Phone numbers are listed for you to ask additional questions about the program.

As Lodges enter the second quarter of the fiscal year, it's not too late to open the discussion of budgeting for the Dictionary Project. Elks across America are fantastic at raising charitable funds to support great programs that have a positive impact on the lives of children in their communities.

Drug Awareness Program

Study finds dangers in pot use during pregnancy

Tetrahydrocannabinol (THC), the psychoactive ingredient in marijuana, remains in breast milk for up to six weeks and may be harmful to infants, a new study warns.

"Just as we now caution mothers to avoid tobacco and alcohol in pregnancy, we recommend that all clinicians counsel women who are pregnant or considering pregnancy to abstain from marijuana throughout pregnancy and in the postpartum period," said senior investigator Dr. Maya Bunik. She is the medical director of the Child Health Clinic at the University of Colorado School of Medicine, in Aurora.

Because of marijuana legalization, it is important to recognize that pregnant and breastfeeding women and their babies are a vulnerable population, and that "exercising caution is imperative,"

she explained.

The study included 25 women who had used marijuana during pregnancy and gave birth between Nov. 1, 2016 and June 30, 2019. Of those, seven women stopped using pot for more than five weeks during the study period. The women who used marijuana told researchers they did so to cope with stress, to sleep better or to relieve pain. Most were using marijuana at least three times a week.

Although THC concentrations varied from woman to woman, it was excreted in their breast milk for up to six weeks after they stopped using marijuana. All had detectable levels of THC in their breast milk when the study ended. THC in breast milk may have serious consequences for infants.

The Elks DAP have long held that research from decades ago showed significant concerns related to marijuana use during pregnancy and breastfeeding. Those concerns include effects on

childhood brain development and learning issues, including attention, impulse control, and early signs of anxiety and depression.

"We here at the DAP have been warning for many years now that today's marijuana products are five to six times more potent than when those studies were initiated," said DAP National Director Kent Gade, "leading to the recommendations by the American Academy of Pediatrics, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists and the Academy of Breastfeeding Medicine to abstain from marijuana use during pregnancy and breastfeeding."

The study was published online March 8 in JAMA Pediatrics.
