New monthly report for Gov. Relations

The new Government Relations Lodge Report, available this summer, has been designed to aid the chairpersons by providing suggestive insight for their committee position.

For example, the first question asks if you have updated your charity book records and entered all of the events. This should prompt the chairpersons to look through their monthly newsletters to ensure that every event that required volunteers or donations was properly documented.

We ask if any communications have been sent to their local government in the last month, because effective government relations require constant contact. A chairperson should always be providing updates to local officials on events the Lodge has been planning.

Don't forget to report on the grant and scholarship opportunities for the students in your town. The new report has incorporated the items necessary for a successful Government Relations team.

By this time in the year, your ER should have already appointed a chairperson. If not, it needs to be someone who will build a better relationship with your local government. The Grand Lodge Manual on Government Relations provides a sample letter for all ERs to use when sending announcements to your local officials. Please use this today if you have not already done so.

In your letter, introduce yourself and your Government Relations Chairperson for the year. Let your town and county officials know your chairperson will be making an appointment to go over the charity book records and upcoming events they should be involved in. Caution: we can not help them politically. We take no sides and are a nonpartisan Order.

We look forward to meeting with your state chairpersons at the Grand Lodge Convention this year. Rest assured, we will be working on the new reporting and how it will assist everyone involved. They will provide you with the opportunity to strengthen and build a better relationship with your local government.

ENF programs receive funding boost with 2022-23 budget

In February, the Elks National Foundation Board of Trustees approved a total budget of \$42.5 million—including \$39.8 million for program services—for the 2022-23 fiscal year: a 7% increase from the 2021-22 budget.

The Foundation's largest program, the Community Investments Program, offers one of the most direct ways for Elks to build stronger communities. The CIP now offers \$15.7 million in grants. Beacon Grants, available to every Lodge, are now worth \$4,000, and a third bonus was added to the \$2,000 Gratitude Grant, which is available to Lodges that

goal in the previous year. The \$500 bonus number of Gunther & Lee Weigel Medical recognizes Lodges with broad-based School Scholarships it awards to 20, and fundraising programs. Lodges that earn the scholarships are worth \$22,000. And, all three bonuses could receive a \$3,500 more than \$130,000 was allocated to Gratitude Grant.

The Elks National Veterans Service Commission also got a boost in the budget. The Commission's Welcome Home program will expand into Orlando and Phoenix in 2022-23. The ENVSC will continue to help veterans exit or avoid homelessness with a \$4.6 million grant from the ENF.

Elks scholarships received a total of \$4.9 million, including \$2.8 million for money back to each state than it received MVS scholarships and \$1.6 million for from that state in donations.

reached the GER's per-Member-giving Legacy Awards. The ENF doubled the Emergency Educational Grants for the children of deceased or disabled Elks.

> The budget allocates \$1.4 million to the Hoop Shoot, an increase for the national program's 50th anniversary. The Drug Awareness Program received \$1 million, including a \$225,000 grant from the DEA. The ENF also granted \$10.4 million to Elks State Associations. Each year, the ENF strives to grant more

Send notice letters to dropped Members

All Lodge Secretaries are required by Statute 14.180 to send a 60-day reinstatement notice letter to Members dropped in March.

An unaffiliated Member whose name has been stricken from the rolls of membership for nonpayment of dues may, on his or her application, if made within sixty (60) days thereafter, be reinstated as a Member in good standing in the Lodge upon majority vote thereof at the next regular meeting and payment of the delinquent and current dues.

The secretary shall advise the unaffiliated Member in writing of the date of their being dropped from the rolls and of their right to re-affiliate within (60) days. The reinstatement shall not result in the loss of continuous and consecutive membership standing. The 60-day reinstatement letter and mail merge option can be found on CLMS2 PC.
