A Brief History of Idaho Elks Rehab

In the next few months my role with the blessing of the attendees at our upcoming Summer Convention will change to State President. I am beyond excited to be the spokesperson for the Idaho State Elks Association and to support our state project: "Idaho Elks Rehab".



For those of you that were not able to attend my presentation at the Winter

Convention held in Lewiston, the presentation began by looking back to the beginnings of the Rehab Hospital. It all began in 1943 when the state purchased the former home of Dr. Collister located in Boise.

When the home was ready to accept patients in 1948 the immediate need had changed to become a convalescence home for children with polio. Over the next decades the state purchased additional property and built the new facility that we now know as the Idaho State Elks Rehab Hospital. While we no longer pro-

vide in person care we continue to support the hospital owned by ISEA and run by St. Lukes.

Our mission has changed, but our focus on helping the residents of Idaho with funding local projects throughout the state has made a big difference in rural areas to help provide Physical Rehabilitation.

There will be more to share in the coming months with new educational products to better understand where we have made a difference.

SPOTLIGHT ON ELKS

Mike and Kay of Coeur d'Alene Lodge #1254 for the past 3 years have been driving an 84 year-old veteran to all his doctors appointments in Spokane and taking him to lunch several times a week. This allows him to get out and get good meals that he otherwise wouldn't be able to enjoy.

Ron Fry, PER of Mt. Home Lodge #2276 was informed that a long-time Elk needed a ride to the hospital. Even though it was fairly late, he jumped in his car, drove across town, took the fellow Elk to the hospital and waited until they were transported to Boise. When informed of a fellow Elk who had lost his previous ride to a regular monthly eye appointment, Mr. Fry stepped up to drive that Elk to the appointments.

State Major Project

Ten years after ceasing operation of the rehab hospital, there still remains some confusion or uncertainty about what our state project is. Simply, our state project, Idaho Elks Rehab, advances community rehab across the state by funding rehab through partnerships with providers.

The impact of our state project over the last decade is nothing short of phenomenal. The footprint of Idaho Elks Rehab funding continues to stretch further and further across the state, from Bonners Ferry in the far north to Preston in the extreme south, and everywhere in between. Idaho Elks Rehab-funded projects and efforts are found in communities large and small – Bonners Ferry, Sandpoint, Post Falls, Wallace, St. Maries, Orofino, Lewiston, Moscow, Grangeville, Silverton, Salmon, Idaho Falls, Blackfoot, Pocatello, American

Falls, Preston, Twin Falls, Mountain Home, Caldwell, Weiser, Marsing, and Boise.

Over the years, we have funded 26 Local Lodge Grants at \$1,000 each and 27 Community Rehab Grants totaling

\$278,200. In addition to grants, we have also committed funds to several large projects, such as Idaho Elks Children's Pavilion in Boise, Valley Vista in St. Maries, and Franklin County Medical Center in Preston.

Idaho Elks members can help fund grants by investing in our state project in a number of ways, including general donations, memorials, "Change for Rehab" campaign, C-Notes, "If Every Idahoan Gave \$1" campaign, and bricks. Also, including Idaho Elks Rehab in your will presents an opportunity to create a lasting legacy with your state project.
