- When approved, the ENF mails scholar meet-up information, including a list of Elks scholars in the area.
- The Elks scholars gather over a meal to learn more about each other, the Elks and the ENF.
- The organizer sends in receipts, photos and an attendance list, and is reimbursed at a maximum rate of \$10/Elks scholar in attendance.

- Scholars contact the Lodge if they are available to help!




Elks Scholar Month of Service

- This was an increase from 34 Elks scholar participants in 2010.


