Welcome Home



At the request of the VA, our program offers additional resources in areas of high need. This includes Chicago, New York, Washington, D.C., San Diego, Los Angeles, Loma Linda, San Francisco, Seattle, Miami-Dade, Tampa-Orlando, Las Vegas, and Phoenix.



Welcome Home Kits

Most formerly homeless veterans move into new homes with nothing. Here's how to get started.

- 1. Find out what the veteran needs. Start with a standard list of what a new home would need, and then tailor the kit to the needs and preferences of the veteran.
- 2. Shop for the items. Look for deals. Ask Lodge members if they have items to donate. Hold a supply drive to collect common items.
- 3. Assemble and deliver the kit! Deliver the kit to the veteran or project partner. Stay in touch with the veteran if you can.
- 4. Submit your receipts to the ENVSC online. The ENVSC will reimburse your Lodge up to \$300 for each Welcome Home Kit you provide, and up to \$500 for each kit that also includes a bed.



Tips from the Experts

Forming great relationships with other organizations that provide referrals, local or with the VA and always staying persistent with the work you do.

After identifying and meeting with organizations that help house veterans, I created a checklist. It starts the conversation about the kinds of things we can purchase and allows input from the veteran receiving the Kit.

I try to keep an eye out for items I buy a lot of for veterans and look for sales. There are some stores that offer discount pricing to Veterans or activeduty military so if the Lodge has someone to help with the shopping who is a Vet that can really help with the cost.

Focus Grants

Lodges in the 12 areas of focus are eligible for additional Focus Grant funding of up to \$10,000 for large-scale, Elks-run, direct service projects.

Here are some examples:

- Food baskets and monthly dinners for newly housed veterans.
- Provide furniture and home supplies for veterans moving into permanent housing.
- Monthly cooking workshops, meals, and support at a veterans housing facility.
- Stock and manage a food and hygiene pantry at a veterans housing facility.

Good Partnerships = Good Projects

"We've been working with U.S. Vets for so many years that a lot of the veterans there know who we are and so they're willing to reach out more. In the beginning the veterans were a little nervous but now they seem more comfortable.

We started with the dinners at U.S. Vets and we'd sit with the veterans and talk with them. And then we moved on last year to the off-site events."

Elks Emergency Assistance Program

Run out of the ENVSC office in Chicago, this program provides emergency financial assistance directly to veterans to help them exit or prevent homelessness.

Veterans registered with and receiving services from the Department of Veterans Affairs in the 12 areas* with the highest number of homeless veterans can apply for one-time monetary assistance to prevent homelessness or secure a home.

Uses include rent, security deposits, and utilities. Veterans must be referred by a VA social worker.

The Elks' Impact

Welcome Home Kits

- Since the start of the Welcome Home Kits program through May 31, we have provided 7,816 kits to help veterans transition into permanent housing.
- + Volunteers from 237 Elks Lodges have provided kits for veterans across 40 states.
- + In total we have spent \$1,810,300 on kits, for an average cost of \$232 per veteran (not including the value of donated items.)

Focus Grants

- + 221 Grants have been awarded to Lodges in the 12 areas with the highest number of homeless veterans have received grants
- + Lodges serve an average of 2,500 homeless veterans each year
- + Lodges can apply for between \$5,000 and \$10,000

Emergency Assistance

- + Since the Elks Emergency Assistance Fund started, we have helped 3,049 veterans stay or become housed.
- The average amount of assistance given to a veteran is \$1,640 (with a \$2,500 maximum).
- Over the life of the program, 41% of bills paid have gone to rent, 30% to utilities, 15% to security deposits, and 14% have gone to special requests.

Good News!

2010-2020 Accomplishments





Nearly 50% reduction in Veteran homelessness since 2010. 82 communities and three states— Connecticut, Delaware and Virginia—have effectively ended Veteran homelessness,



850,000 Veterans and their family members permanently housed, rapidly rehoused or prevented from becoming homeless since 2010.



Just short of **37,000** Veterans experiencing homelessness,
