

HAMILTON GRANGE NATIONAL MEMORIAL

WHAT IS TODAY HAMILTON Grange National Memorial was built in 1802 to serve as Alexander Hamilton's estate. Hamilton died in 1804, shortly after the Grange, as it was known, was completed, but members of the Hamilton family continued to live there until 1833, after which the home fulfilled various roles, serving first as a private home for a series of families, then as a church and school, and finally as a museum. In 1889, as the urban landscape of New York City expanded around the Grange, the home was moved to another area of Manhattan, and in 1962, it became a national memorial supervised by the National Park Service. The home was moved once more in 2008, when it was relocated to Saint Nicholas Park in upper Manhattan. There it underwent extensive restorations and was reopened to the public in 2011.
