End the school year with recognition

This month marks Elks National Youth Week (May 1-7) where all Lodges should take time to recognize and honor the young people in our communities who perform at a high level in academics, athletics, and community service.

With most school years now coming to a close, use Elks National Youth Week to host a banquet or awards ceremony to honor a Student/Teenager of the Year, along with other youth awards. This program aims to find students or teenagers whose accomplishments deserve public recognition and praise. Monthly award recipients should be considered great candidates for the annual award.

If your Lodge doesn't currently run a Student/Teenager of the Year/Month program, now is the time to contact local school officials to review the program so that it can be launched in the fall when students return.

The Elks JROTC Award is another Grand Lodge Activities Committee program that provides an opportunity for Lodges to honor a high school cadet in their community.

This program has recently been approved by the military and is now fully sanctioned across all JROTC units. The full program will be published in the next

issue of the military uniform code (CCR 145-2) as a nationally recognized program listed as the "Benevolent & Protective Order Of Elks (B.P.O.E.) Award."

Recipients of this award are selected by a unit's Senior Army Instructor or Director of Army Instruction, with a focus on recognizing a cadet's community service work along with demonstrating outstanding leadership and patriotism. Cadets must be in good standing in all military aspects and academics as well.

Cadets that receive this award are now able to wear our award medal and ribbon bar on their uniform and can list our award as a recognized achievement as they progress through their academic and military careers.

These awards can have lasting impacts on the recipients. In addition to boosting self-esteem, these awards are used by students to help gain admission to colleges, win academic scholarships, and secure employment opportunities. Think of the impact your Lodge can have on your community by simply recognizing the work our young people are already doing. Our youth are our future, they are *Elkdom's Heart for America*.

CIP celebrates 20 years of success

Twenty years ago, Carrie Underwood gained national fame by winning American Idol, the Chicago White Sox weren't historically bad (and won a World Series to prove it), Star Wars: Episode III - Revenge of the Sith ended the Star Wars franchise (or so we thought), and the Community Investments Program was born.

When the CIP debuted in 2005, each grant was worth \$200, and we approved applications from 695 Lodges. A lot has changed since then, but one thing remains the same: the CIP's commitment to helping you build stronger communities.

This year, to commemorate the CIP's

Grant will increase from \$2,000 to \$3,000. Every Lodge that meets the per-Membergiving goal of \$5 will have \$1,000 more to support community needs; Lodges will be eligible to receive a total of up to \$5,000 through additional bonuses.

With the Beacon, Spotlight, and Gratitude Grants, Lodges can receive up to \$11,000 to use in their community to help fight hunger, prevent veteran homelessness, or address other needs.

Now that's a reason to celebrate! Follow the ENF on social media and be on the lookout for more as we celebrate 20 years of the CIP.

They took him in, fed him, got him a place to stay for the night. A couple of members who were mechanics fixed his truck up and sent him on his way the next day. He never forgot those folks."

Always be there with the Voluntary Service Program

With the Voluntary Service program, Elks are supporting veterans every day of the year in more than 400 facilities nationwide. Thanks to the Boost Grant. Voluntary Service Representatives are planning new events for veterans.

In Yale, Michigan, Representative Scott Harris and Port Huron Lodge No. 343 will host a veteran lunch event with on-site services for attendees. This event started three years ago, when Scott and his Lodge held an event to spread information about the Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act, with help from a Boost Grant.

This year, veterans will have the opportunity to share a meal together and access soft wave therapy, haircuts, therapeutic massages, and more. These events have been a tremendous success, connecting veterans with valuable resources from local service organizations and healthcare providers. This is an especially helpful event for a rural area.

At the State Veterans Home in Cameron, Missouri, Representative Samantha Barrett plans to use a Boost Grant to establish a pen pal program for veterans and local students. As a volunteer, Barrett

has seen how this program can reduce veteran loneliness and believes it will

> teach children about their history and who the veterans are. "I hope that this project will inspire the next group of ENVSC volunteers," Barrett said.

> > In addition to grant projects, volunteers also show up on a consistent basis to create relationships and offer support.

In Fort Collins, Colorado, Representative Carol Jones has continued a previous volunteer's tradition of providing a coffee station for veterans awaiting

National Prevention Week, sponsored by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), is a public education platform showcasing the work of communities and organizations across the country that are preventing substance use and promoting positive mental health.

This year, National Prevention Week takes place from May 11-17. If your Lodge is interested in participating, you can learn more about how you can throughout the week and register for the events taking place by going to the SAMHSA website. Most people don't realize drugs can be Recognizing National Prevention Week laced with fentanyl, or with how much, is a great way to enhance your position in your community.

The DEA has announced that May 10 is also National Fentanyl Awareness Day. This day is an effort to educate individuals about the dangers that fentanyl poses to the safety and health of Americans. Traffickers often mix fentanyl with other drugs like cocaine, heroin, and methamphetamine. It can also be found in vape pens, counterfeit pills, and ecstasy. Fentanyl is about 50 times more potent than heroin and 100 times more potent than morphine, according to the DEA. Center in Kansas City.
