FEATURED LODGE VISALIA ELKS LODGE #1298

Visalia, CA is the oldest San Joaquin Valley town between Los Angeles and French Camp. It's the Crown Jewel of the San Joaquin Valley and well worth your time to take the Hwy 198 exit East to Visalia from Highway 99.

One of the first inhabitants of a fort built by the settlers to protect themselves from Native Americans (unnecessarily as it turns out), was Nathaniel Vise. Nathaniel was responsible for surveying the new settlement. In November of 1852, he wrote, "The town contains from 60-80 inhabitants, 30 of whom are children of school age. The town is located upon one of the subdivisions of the Kaweah (River) and is destined to be the county seat of Tulare." In 1853, that prediction became a reality and Visalia has remained the County Seat since that time.

In 1858 Visalia was added to John Butterfield's Overland Stage route from St. Louis to San Francisco. A plaque commemorating the location can be found at 116 East Main Street.

The reason I'm telling you this is to impress upon you the important part that

the BPOE Elks Lodge #1298 played in the early years of Visalia and its residence.

Visalia Lodge #1298 was granted Dispensation on May 24, 1913, just 60 years after the settlement of Visalia was formed. And has been active in the community ever since.

The Land for our original building was purchased in 1913 on the corner of Main and Locust, and construction on the building began in 1916. It was completed in 1918 for a whopping sum of \$65,000.00.

We Lost our original lodge to a fire on December 1, 1959, but on September 9, 1962 we were back in business at our new location on West Main and proudly still call it home today.

We host numerous events each month. A couple of our most popular events are the Veterans Breakfast (which is open to the public) and served the 2nd Sunday of the month, and our Cook Your Own Steak night on the 3rd Friday of each month.

There aren't many entities in town that can claim 125 years. Bakersfield itself was first incorporated 145 years ago, so for any group to be more than 100 years old it had to put itself together while the city was still new.

But members of the Elks Lodge have never been ones to sit on the sidelines. In its 125 years, the fraternal organization has not only been part of Bakersfield's history, it has accumulated plenty of its own, too.

"It was chartered before oil was found in the oil fields," said Jason Browder, Elks Lodge member and chair of the birthday event. "A lot of history that correlates with the lodge also correlates with Bakersfield."

On Saturday, the Elks Lodge will celebrate its 125th birthday, just a few days before its actual anniversary on Tuesday. The event will include a program on the club's history and barbecue ribs, made by volunteers. Member or not, everyone is welcome to celebrate the milestone.

"(Come) to get an understanding of the history of the Elks and what the future may hold for the next 125 years," Browder said.

Rep. Kevin McCarthy, state Sen. Andy Vidak and Kern County Supervisor Leticia Perez will also be there, proclaiming June 23 Elks Day. Dignitaries from the California-Hawaii Elks Association (of which the local lodge is a part) are due to come, too.

Current Exalted Ruler Nancy Fenwick said, "It's about respecting the years we've been here and what's been accomplished."

While much of the club's history remains unknown (or yet to be discovered in lodge documents), at least four members have been doing some digging to find out more: Browder, Fenwick, Secretary Bill Wilson and Tiler Brian Payne.

The Elks Lodge was instituted in 1893, as part of the national organization that started 25 years earlier. It first met at what is now the Haberfelde Building at 1710 Chester Ave.



In 1924, it moved to 17th and Eye streets, where the City of Bakersfield Building Department now is. When the 1952 earthquake struck the city, the upper floors were condemned and the group used only the lower levels until, in 1969, it moved to its current location at 1616 30th St., formerly the Bufeteria Restaurant.

Founding members of the local Elks Lodge were at the grand opening of the Santa Fe Railroad in 1898, Browder said. Throughout the years the lodge was a regular part of the Christmas parade and was well known in town for its famous steak feeds.

In 2001, the local club opened its membership to women, who had previously been allowed into specific programs but not the lodge itself. "Without the women, I don't think we could exist here," said Wilson, who's been a member for 18 years. "They work their tails off."

Although the Elks Lodge once had as many as 3,000 members, since the late 1990s membership has stayed under 1,000. Currently, the lodge has 384 members.

"Getting members has been the constant challenge throughout the years," said Fenwick, a member of 15 years.

Even with a much smaller membership base, the Elks Lodge is still continuing the organization's mission to help those in need, encourage patriotism and good fellowship and recognize a belief in God. Their work continues with the organization's motto at heart: Elks Care and Elks Share

Members meet twice a month and hold events throughout the year to raise money. Causes the Elks help include veterans groups, scholarships for local students and an annual Christmas event for kids in need. Over the years, the lodge has helped several thousand local kids and given hundreds of thousands of dollars in scholarships, Browder estimated. "I've ran across several people ... that say, 'Oh, I went to that!" Fenwick said of the impact the Christmas events have had on the community. "The teachers tell us what it meant to the kids."

With other lodges in the California-Hawaii Elks Association, it also contributes to its "purple pig" fundraising arm to help disabled children walk, see, talk and play. The local lodge also donated funds to those affected by Hurricane Harvey and the Erskine fire.

Anyone in the community who wants to learn more about the Elks and how to join are encouraged to come to the birthday celebration. To become a member, one must be a citizen of the United States over 21 years old, who believes in God. Those who meet the requirements need to be sponsored by any member in good standing, with references from two others.
