Scoring Criteria

Applications are scored holistically by a panel of judges and given a designation of “No Award”, “Bronze” (\$500 award), “Silver” (\$750 award), or “Gold” (\$1,000 award) based on the criteria below. When scoring the applications, all of the categories are taken into consideration. However, higher scoring applications stress the applicant’s involvement in Community Service, their Leadership roles, their Financial need, their desire to obtain a college degree, and a well-written essay.

Community Service: This score is based on the type of activity, the commitment to the activity, and the approximate total hours of community service. Applicants are scored based on community service participation throughout his or her high school career. If the school requires Community Service as a graduation requirement we take into consideration the school’s requirement but also consider quality over quantity. We look at the applicant’s motivation to serve and his or her volunteer activities. Is there evidence of meaningful contributions to the community? Is the applicant giving back to his or her community unselfishly? We compare the amount of community service to work experience and involvement in extracurricular activities. We take into consideration whether the applicant spends a significant amount of time at a part-

time job since activities might be limited by this commitment. This score measures the quantity and quality of service. A key part of the Elks mission is serving our community, so this category is strongly considered.

Honors and Awards: Honors and awards should be significant. An exceptional applicant has national and/or international honors and awards, as well as state and regional honors and awards. An average to strong applicant has significant state and regional honors and awards, as well as significant honors and awards at the community and school levels. A weaker applicant has no significant honors and awards. The following is a list of honors and awards that are felt to be significant, though the list is not exhaustive. The final decision determining which awards and honors are deemed significant is up to the committee; these are just some basic guidelines as to what is generally considered significant.

- Eagle Scout Award
- Girl Scout Gold Award
- Teen of the Year
- Youth of the Year
- National Honor Society officer positions
- National Merit Scholar
- Student Government officer positions
- John and Abigail Adams Scholarship recipient
- AP Scholar
- Major Athletic Awards (ex: athlete of the semester, year, state, state winner)
- Major Academic Awards (ex: national honors society member, state/national academic titles, student of the month/term, honor rolls)

Extracurricular Activities: This score is based on the activities listed, and how long the applicant was involved in each activity. More consideration is given to any leadership positions the applicant may have held in the extracurricular activities such as Student Government or Club officer positions or team captain. The applicant's position(s) of leadership and the responsibilities held in that leadership role are considered. Has the applicant held leadership positions with increased responsibility and leadership across the four years as reflected by increasingly higher positions held? Has the applicant forged frontiers in activities? Do the leadership positions demonstrate a passion for the activity?

Employment: Scoring in the work experience category is based on approximate total hours worked. Work includes time spent taking care of siblings, working on a family farm or in a family business, even if the applicant was not paid. Is work experience during the school year done while maintaining academic excellence and service in school and community activities? Did the applicant overcome adverse family social or economic conditions and still achieve? Does the student work full-time during the summer? Judges compare the amount of work experience to involvement in extracurricular activities and take into consideration whether the student

spends a significant amount of time at a part-time job, since activities might be limited by this commitment.

Academics: Academics are judged holistically by the following criteria.

- Excellent–The applicant’s academic information illustrates extremely strong academic performance
- Strong–The applicant’s academic information demonstrates strong characteristics
- Average–The applicant’s information is satisfactory
- Below Average–The applicant’s application lacks certain requested academic information and/or the information presented is not satisfactory.
- Weak–The majority of academic information is missing.
- 0: No information provided.

Financial Need/Desire to obtain a college education We consider the applicant’s explanation of need in terms of income, number of household members, and number of household members attending college. This section may also include an explanation of special circumstances regarding the applicant’s desire and reasons to obtain a college degree which is taken into consideration as well.

Essay: Essay scores are based on the mechanics, style, and content of the essay. Essays should be clearly written and well organized and should sustain a well-focused discussion. The essay should enable the judges to get to know the applicant better. The writer should answer the question and explore ideas with insightful reasoning, persuasive examples, a mature outlook, and/or a deep concern for society. Is it well written? Will this applicant make us proud to call him or her a Racky Scholar? Historically, applications with strong essays score higher.
