AUTOS USED BY MANY ELKS TO REACH REUNION

Licenses from All States in Union on Streets.

The popularity of the automobile as a mode of travel is being emphasized strongly during the convention of Elks in Cincinnati this week. Everywhere may be seen cars in which the delegates and their families drove to attend the gathering. Machines bearing Florida licenses stood alongside those which came from Wisconsin; Massachusetts cars bumped against cars from the State of Idaho and citizens of the Queen City became as accustomed to see Illinois and Michigan licenses as they are to seeing Ohio and Indiana cars.

this aided considerably."
