Negaunee, the twin cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul, Ishpeming, Sault Ste. Marie, Iron Mountain, and other Iron County towns. Several officers of the Michigan Elks' Association, of which Harry Scott of Calumet was the President, also came for the great occasion. It was the most important and biggest day in Elkdom in Northern Michigan. The Gazette reported that "the Elks of Michigan now know how the Calumet Elks can entertain and will be tickled to get the chance to again visit the Calumet Lodge."

Lodge officers when the twenty-fifth Anniversary rolled around in 1923 were Charles D. Hohl, Exalted Ruler; Frank X. Sedlar, Est. Leading Knight; John Kivela, Est. Loyal Knight; Sigurd B. Olson, Est. Lecturing Knight, George Kemp, Secretary; Ben Borchgrevink, Treasurer; and Pat Brennan, Tiler.

Somehow the Lodge survived Prohibition and the Depression of the 1930's. It was during this time that many Elk Lodges folded in Michigan and throughout the country. Although membership declined during the late 1920's and 1930's, it again rose during the 1940's.

By the time the Golden Anniversary came on May 14 and 15, 1948, the Lodge was again strong in membership. The officers in 1948 included Frank R. Marzene, Exalted Ruler; Robert R. Stenson, Est. Leading Knight; J. Hartley H. Bay, Est. Loyal Knight; Reino S. Koivunen, Est. Lecturing Knight; James Aldridge, Esquire; Robert McCormack, Chaplain; Harry Vivian, Secretary; Gordon Harvey, Treasurer; Wendell J. Kraft, Inner Guard; and P. J. Brennan, Tiler. Elks from throughout the Copper Country and other parts of the Upper Peninsula joined the Calumet Lodge with their two-day festivities, which began on Friday evening with a stag night and smoker in the temple. The evening's entertainment was highlighted by a mock initiation of that put on fifty years earlier
