Maryland-bound,







It was about keeping my head up and moving on, no matter what.

The nationals were not about winning; it was that years of practice paid off. It was about the experience and knowing how far hard work could take me.

After a month of getting ready, it was time for the ELKS NATIONAL free-throw championship in Chicago. The ELKS were very helpful and made the whole experience unforgettable. They covered all the expenses for my parents and me, which was awesome.

When we arrived at the Hilton, Chicago, on Thursday, April



21st, 2023, they had a hospitality room for all the shooters, with many activities planned. We got trading cards and this "Best Swishes" book.

Friday, April 22nd, was all about practice. Each region was




assigned a time to practice for the competitions coming up on Saturday. It was time to prepare and get ready before the big day.

Surprisingly, I felt calm after warmups and under the pressure. Being one among twelve contenders helped my nerves.



I was the first to shoot out of the 12 competitors. In the first round, I made 10 for 10. Three others matched my score and shot 10 for 10.

I found my rhythm with each shot in round two and made 15 for 15. I hit every single shot. Now, the best the others could do

was tie with me. After the last person shot, 1 in 12 odds didn't matter, a milestone I had never managed before. I hit every single shot, 25 out of 25—a perfect score.











My journey through the ELKS HOOP SHOOT has been a rollercoaster of determination, setbacks, and exciting moments. It taught me to aim high and never give up.



According to Makenna Cannon, the youth program manager for the Elks, the ELKS HOOP SHOOT is about "GRIT." It's about the ability to keep pushing even when things seem tough. She said, "Grit doesn't always get you the win, but it pushes Hoop Shooters to set new goals and keep going, and that drive is something they'll keep with them forever."

I have gotten to know a lot about GRIT. For three years, I made it to the Regional Finals and faced disappointment each time. Traveling 4 to 5 hours away to shoot 25 foul shots, only to come up short, tempted me to give up. But I didn't. I kept practicing and kept my goal of making it to the National Finals.

When I finally made it to Nationals, I didn't miss a shot. And being the only one with a perfect score for the girls earned me the National Championship and two special awards. One was the Getty Powell Award, named after the Hoop Shoot's first National
