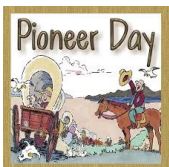
MORE SPECIAL EVENTS IN JULY

Focus: Budget, Committee, and Partner Mapping

June is focused on laying the foundation for a strong and organized launch. This month, the priority is to build the program's structure by forming a 4-6 person committee, drafting the annual budget, and identifying the schools and community partners we want to connect with.

I have already heard whispers suggesting, "She is pretty busy, so she probably won't be around long." I want to assure you that this couldn't be further from the truth. We have already made headway on some of the changes I wanted to make by using the relationships and connections I have built within the community. Please rest assured that I do not say yes to something lightly. I never have, and I never will. From running professionally, to climbing the corporate ladder, to now building two businesses, when I commit to something, you will get all of me.

While I may not be able to attend every single event or be physically present for everything, I am diligently working behind the scenes on everything my name is tied to. I am committed, invested, and always available to chat with any of our members.

During this planning phase, we will also begin reaching out to law enforcement or local prevention coalitions to explore alignment, available resources, and potential collaboration. These conversations will help ensure the program is not operating in isolation but is instead connected to the broader community support systems already in place.

Another important part of June will be taking inventory of current supplies and identifying what additional materials may be needed for future outreach. By the end of the month, the goal is to have a draft budget, a committee roster, a target list of schools and partners, and a preliminary August through October calendar. These pieces will help create a clear path forward as we move from planning into execution.

SCHOLARSHIP AND STUDENT OF THE YEAR REPORT

We had a successful scholarship awards banquet on Monday, May 4, according to all the very positive feedback we received. Many of the attendees expressed their approval of the format of the meeting as we moved things right along. Our various Lodge committee representatives that presented their certificates were well prepared and professional. We had 12 dozen cookies provided by Digby's Market.

We had a little over 115 people in total attendance.

We gave away a total of \$104,000 during the evening to 39 winners. Along with those from our Lodge, these awards included our judged application winners from National & State Scholarships. The breakdown is: \$47,000 from our Lodge (29 awardees) and \$57,000 from National and state (eight awardees)

Along with the financial scholarships, we had two National Scholarship Service Trip winners, who went to Milwaukee this year. Each year Elks National Foundation hosts three Elks Scholar Service Trips where chosen students travel to a different city around the U.S. to serve in the name of the Elks

Of course, the big winner was our National Most Valuable Student, Keaton Earl whose scholarship was for \$30,000. Keaton was one of 20 national winners out of over 23,000 judged applicants. Lance and I were invited to attend his high school awards night to again present the certificate to him in front of his peers.

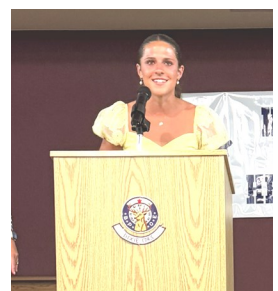

Gayle Verschoor and I initially Co-Chaired the committee, and all of this success would not have happened if it had not been for Gayle's dedication and hard work. Also, a huge thank you goes out to many people who, as always, stepped up to share knowledge, and generally offer a most appreciated helping hand.

On May 14th, the annual Student of the Year reception was held to honor the outstanding students at our local high schools. Fifteen schools participated, with each choosing a male and female recipient. Additionally, all three local JROTC programs chose a Cadet of the Year to honor. At this event, each student was awarded a certificate and a gift of \$100 from the St. George Elks Lodge, plus \$25 each from Cache Valley Bank, and State Bank of Southern Utah. Many thanks to the Elks members who made the event possible, especially the Bingo players that helped set up the tables, Elaine Heger-Gubler for manning the sign-in table and who arranged the funding from the banks, and Susan Shurtliff for taking photos of the event and staying to help clean up. We received many thanks from the participating schools and awardees.

FOURTH OF JULY HISTORY

When the initial battles in the Revolutionary War broke out in April 1775, few colonists desired complete independence from Great Britain. Those who did were considered radical. By the middle of the following year, however, many more colonists had come to favor independence, thanks to growing hostility against Britain and the spread of revolutionary sentiments.

On June 7, when the Second Continental Congress met at the Pennsylvania State House (later Independence Hall) in Philadelphia, the Virginia delegate Richard Henry Lee introduced a motion calling for the colonies' independence. Amid heated debate, the Congress postponed the vote on Lee's resolution but appointed a five-man committee—including Thomas Jefferson of Virginia, John Adams of Massachusetts, Roger Sherman of Connecticut, Benjamin Franklin of Pennsylvania and Robert R. Livingston of New York—to draft a formal statement justifying the break with Great Britain.

On July 2, the Continental Congress approved Lee's resolution for independence in a near-unanimous vote (the New York delegation abstained but later voted affirmatively). The following day, John Adams wrote to his wife, Abigail, that July 2 "will be celebrated, by succeeding generations, as the great anniversary festival" and that the celebration should include "Pomp and Parade...Games, Sports, Guns, Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other."

On July 4, the Continental Congress formally adopted the Declaration of Independence, which Jefferson largely wrote. Although the vote for actual independence took place on July 2, from then on the Fourth of July became the day that was celebrated as the start of American independence.
