It was December 23 in the ENVSC office in Chicago, when we received a call from a veteran in Arkansas. He'd called everywhere seeking help. Someone told him that the Elks help veterans, and he found our number online. He was staying in a motel with his young son and daughter, recently evicted. They had only the clothes they were wearing. They were out of food and couldn't visit the local food bank again until January 1.

We reached out to an Elks volunteer in the state to see if he had any ideas. He drove 3 hours on Christmas Eve morning to visit this veteran and provide him with supplies. He also used his state veteran's coalition connections, who rallied to ensure the family had food, Christmas gifts, and a way forward.

We don't know who directed him to call the Elks, but we're glad they did. As we reflected on the 2024-25 year, we wanted not just to report on all that Elks accomplished in service to veterans, but to find a way to spread the word, because you never know when someone might need to know where to go for help.

As you flip through these pages, you'll notice that some are perforated: these are postcards! Tear them out, address them, and send them out into the world to spread the word about the Elks National Veterans Service Commission.

A Message from the ENVSC Chair

I am so proud to serve as the Chairperson of the Elks National Veterans Service Commission (ENVSC). It was truly an honor to be part of this committee when I first joined as an advisor, and it continues to be one of the greatest privileges of my time with the Elks.

Over the years, I have personally witnessed the incredible impact the ENVSC has had on veterans across the country. In Minnesota, I've been involved in everything from hosting local dinners for veterans, to delivering food and household supplies, to assisting those in need within their homes. During my travels, I have also seen many other inspiring events nationwide—each made possible through funds provided by the Elks National Foundation (ENF).

In Minnesota, we proudly host Veterans Deer Hunts in the fall in partnership with the Disabled American Veterans. Similarly, a Turkey Hunt with the same mission is held at Camp Ripley—the third largest National Guard training base in the country. Both events are generously supported by ENVSC grants.

Through my position, I am fortunate to learn about the more than 400 facilities nationwide that receive ENVSC funding. Every month, Elks at these facilities directly support veterans—providing essentials like clothes, hygiene supplies, and hosting recreational activities like bingo and card games that bring companionship and joy.

One of our most meaningful initiatives is the Welcome Home Kits program, which helps combat veteran homelessness. These kits supply essential items for veterans moving into new homes or apartments and often include funding to purchase beds. This program represents a significant portion of our ENVSC funding—and for good reason. It is a true pride and joy. Last year, Elks delivered 4,252 kits. One Minnesota Lodge alone has distributed over 1,300 kits since inception. The smiles and gratitude we receive from veterans remind us why this work is so important.

These examples are just a small glimpse of what the ENVSC provides. None of it would be possible without the continued support of the ENF. On behalf of the entire committee, I extend our heartfelt thanks to the ENF Board for their ongoing generosity and commitment. Their support allows us not only to sustain our programs but to expand our impact year after year.


727 Elks provided monthly, ongoing support to veterans in more than 400 facilities nationwide through the Elks Voluntary Service program in 2024-25.

Elks Voluntary Service Representatives and Deputy Representatives are a particularly impressive group of volunteers. When veterans are away from home, Elks make sure they feel welcomed, comfortable, and connected. Whether it's at a VA Medical Center, a Veterans Home, or a rehabilitation clinic, veterans know they can count on the Elks to be there consistently, with each volunteer visiting an average of 2.3 times each month. Last year, Elks served more than 744,842 veterans through this program.

"The Bakes and Bites project at the Idaho State Veterans Home is greatly enjoyed and enriches the lives of the participants," says Representative Judith Wutzke, who helps fund and run the event with Elks funds. "Conversation about wonderful childhood memories surrounding food happens at these weekly events."

These Welcome Home Kits included items like dishes, sheets and blankets, pots and pans, towels, toasters, and even food. Not only did participation in this program grow 25% from the previous year, but additional allotted funding ensured that more veterans than ever had a place to lay their head: 43.5% of kits also included beds for veterans and/or their children.

Lodges often include special touches with kits.

VETERANS KINDNESS AND RECOGNITION ELKS OFFER LOCAL

from all 50 108,249 Freedom 2024-25 Grants to serve states used 1,003 Lodges veterans in Last year, 12,445 Elks members volunteered 67,216 hours to meet the needs of veterans through Freedom Grants. Projects are tailored to local needs. Willoughby-Cleveland, Ohio, Lodge No. 18 purchased warm winter clothes for veterans, and Kingman, Ariz., Lodge No. 468 funded educational resources for veterans in a transitional housing program.

Raleigh, N.C., Lodge No. 735 held their annual adaptive fishing derby for veterans with disabilities. For many projects, it's not just the support but the remembrance that matters. "We arranged for a unique event where 60 veteran inpatients at the Brockton Veterans Affairs Medical Center (VAMC)., spread across three different wards—Hospice, Rehabilitation, and Long-Term Care—each received a personal, high-quality Prime Rib dinner accompanied by a variety of delicious desserts," writes H. David Cramer, Freedom Grant Project Manager Mansfield, Mass., Lodge No. 2633.

"Many of the veterans had not had the opportunity to enjoy a meal like this for some time, and seeing their faces light up with gratitude was incredibly rewarding for everyone involved. The event was a reminder that even small gestures of kindness and recognition can have a profound impact on someone's well-being, especially when they are in a vulnerable state."

AND A FRESH STAR OFFERS VETERANS ST OUR FUND The Elks Emergency Assistance Fund helped 558 veterans exit or prevent homelessness in 2024-25. In 2024-25, Elks partnered with VA Social Workers in the 12 cities with the highest number of veterans experiencing homelessness. Together, we provided 558 veterans with emergency financial assistance in the form of rent, security deposits and utility payments. Veterans received an average of \$1,659, showing that a helping hand at the right time can make a big impact.

One of those veterans was a young Marine Corps veteran who moved across country looking for a fresh start after dealing with service-connected health issues. Elks helped him pay a security deposit in April and months later, he sent a note of Thanksgiving.

"I'm a USMC veteran who had received a great financial help from the Elks. I just want to say thank you so much, and may God bless you and yours. I'm very grateful for your support. I'm doing well, I'm in school and have plans for the future."

Grant projects that directly served unhoused veterans or veterans in transitional 22,017 hours to run Focus **Elks volunteered** housing in 2024-25. 1,074

As part of the Elks pledge to help end veteran homelessness, Lodges in the 12 areas with the highest number of veterans experiencing homelessness have access to additional grant funds through Focus Grants . Last year, 41 Lodges put in a remarkable amount of time to run these large-scale, handson projects. Though it is hard work, it's work that makes a difference in veterans' lives, at a time when outside support is truly needed.

Westchester, Calif., Lodge No. 2050 partnered with local nonprofit U.S. Vets to plan social activities and offer material support to veterans in transitional housing facilities. Elks also scheduled regular outings on the town; from basketball and hockey games to food truck fests and dinners at the Lodge.

"The trust built from these events encouraged veterans new to the organization to receive critical services as well as assisting them in getting involved with the outside community," reports Project Manager Fiona Engler. "The Elks provided not only social interaction, but community and a sense of belonging which increased the likelihood of these veterans experiencing success."

GLOVES AND CRAFT KITS HELP VETERANS RECOVER AND THRIVE.



wheelchair gloves, and 8,929 craft kits from the Elks, thanks to the **/eterans Leather Program** The Elks Veterans Leather Program depends on an impressive network of support to produce high-quality leather that can be turned into wheelchair gloves, and into craft kits thanks to our partnership with Help Heal Veterans. Last year, Elks from 9 states collected 8,425 hides.

Elks distribute these gloves and craft kits at veterans' facilities and adaptive sports events. This year, Programs Associate Rene Villalobos distributed gloves to veterans at the National Veterans Wheelchair Games. Events include power soccer, weightlifting, basketball, cycling and archery. The ENVSC sponsors several national adaptive sports events like this every year.

"As we helped fit the gloves to each veteran's hands, we not only ensured their comfort but engaged in meaningful conversations about the mission of the Elks organization," Villalobos shares. "These interactions gave me a deeper appreciation for the veterans' courage and determination. Volunteering at the Wheelchair Games is not only a humbling experience but also a profound reminder of the impact that service and community can have on our veterans' lives."

Our volunteers truly mean it: last year, Elks and their friends volunteered 1,249,959 hours in service to veterans. Here's an update from a new volunteer who hit the ground running in summer of 2024.

"August was an amazing month. The coffee station of course is going strong. Our Lodge also participated in two VA support events. First was the Northern Colorado VA Veterans Appreciation Day. Six volunteers including myself set up a table to inform veterans as to what the Elks do," shares Carol Jones, Voluntary Service Representative at Fort Collins VA Clinic.

"We also gave out two pairs of leather wheelchair gloves, some leather craft kits, and over 100 challenge coins. We heard stories for hours from WW2 veterans to the War on Terror veterans.

The following Friday, we set up the booth again for the Veterans Plaza Golf Tourney. So many people had no idea what the Elks do, both VA staff and Veterans. We made a lot of connections and are finding more ways to get involved."

Thanks to our new and longstanding volunteers, veterans know that the Elks will always show up for them.

We're proud to announce that the 2025 National Veterans Service Volunteer of the Year is Darrell Quinley! In a stroke of serendipity, he received his award at the 2025 Elks National Convention, which took place in his hometown of Kansas City.

As the Missouri State Veterans Chair for the Elks organization, Darrell Quinley is tasked with guiding volunteers in his state and across the country in service to veterans in their communities. It's just one of the many titles he's held across Elkdom, including PER, Missouri Elk of the year, Missouri Veteran Volunteer of the Year, Lodge trustee, and more. Through it all, he's thoughtful, calm, and collected.

Quinley provides 16 Voluntary Service Representatives in 14 facilities with funding, guidance, and support to help them meet the needs of veterans wherever they are.

He himself is the lead volunteer at three of these facilities in the Kansas City area, where he visits veterans at VA Medical Centers, Veterans Housing Centers, and State Veterans Homes multiple times each week.

He leads by example. He stocks the food pantry at a veterans housing facility with fresh food and canned goods, he hosts summer barbecues for Veterans Home residents, he donates winter clothes and plans a Christmas dinner for veterans unable to be with their families. He organizes art classes and gives holiday gifts to families staying at the Fisher House while their loved ones seek care at the VA. He provides gifts and supplies for new veteran mothers seeking care at the VA.

When Social Workers in the Kansas City area have a newly housed veteran in need of supplies, they call Darrell, who shows up with a Welcome Home Kit with dishes, pots, pans, bedding, and even a coffeemaker.


In addition to his work within the Elks, Darrell works with the Veterans Assistance League and is on the Board of Directors for the Missouri State Veterans Home.

His commitment does not go unnoticed by those around him. "During my time as an Elk, some of my brightest moments have been my interactions with PER Darrell Quinley, a US Marine. His devotion to helping veterans has been inspiring and admirable and he works tirelessly to assist veterans at all levels of Elkdom," shares Otto Sayles, fellow member of Grandview-Hickman Mills, MO Lodge No. 2088.

So much of Darrell's time is given in service to others, and we're thrilled to be able to honor him for all of his selfless work.
